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# About Stopping Family Violence

Stopping Family Violence (SFV) is the peak body for perpetrator response in family and domestic violence in Western Australia. SFV works across training, research, policy, and advocacy and drives change to create and enhance safety for all adult and child victim-survivors, whilst ensuring perpetrators are held responsible for the harm they cause.

SFV works in meaningful partnerships throughout the family and domestic violence sector, workplaces, schools, clubs, and community organisations. We do this work to create positive shifts in societal behaviours, values, and attitudes. SFV works from primary prevention through to recovery and healing, moving towards enhanced safety for all victim-survivors whilst working towards behaviour change for those who choose to perpetrate family and domestic violence.

Our vision is to create a future where everyone can live without the fear or threat of violence. It is vital that all responses to FDV enhance safety and reduce risk for victim-survivors, whilst always focusing on the perpetrator as the cause of harm. Working together in unity, families can be safer now and we can create a brighter future together for the generations that follow.

# DAMIAN GREEN, CEO ADDRESS STOPPING FAMILY VIOLENCE



I would like to start by acknowledging and paying my deepest respects to those women and children who have lost their lives to Family and Domestic Violence. I offer our condolences and thoughts to those families who have lost someone to the choice of a perpetrator to take the life of a family member or partner. I recognise the ongoing impact that family and domestic violence has on families, which means that many thousands of men, women and children across Australia are living in fear in their own homes, the very place that should be their safest sanctuary.

This year has again been marked by multiple high profile cases of horrific violence perpetrated against families in Western Australia. This ongoing crisis prompted calls for a dedicated Task Force to grapple with some of the significant challenges faced by the service system as it struggles to respond effectively to the numbers and complexity of FDV across the state. We have also seen similar work occurring in other jurisdictions and at a National Level, which again underscores the importance of recognising and responding to what needs to be done in this area.

To support our advocacy and policy efforts, our team at Stopping Family Violence have continued to develop our work and understanding of the changes required to better respond to family and domestic violence. It is ultimately social change and prevention efforts that must be strengthened to ensure we stop family and domestic violence before it starts. To this end we have been pleased to see an extension to funding for the work of Preventing Violence Together (PVT), a joint initiative of SFV and the Centre for Women's Safety and Wellbeing. Together with the increases in funding for primary prevention efforts across the state, the work of PVT has delivered a blueprint for the critical infrastructure and support required to grow this important area of focus for WA.

Our team has travelled all over the Western Australia this year to ensure we support the services that many regional and remote families rely upon. Receiving funding to support Aboriginal Community Controlled Organisations has allowed SFV the opportunity to codesign a framework for ensuring that these local, placed based organisations can build their capability to respond to family and domestic violence safely and effectively, especially when families are already engaged within a service response. This approach effectively seeks to integrate safe and effective work with perpetrators into the broader landscape of work with families.

# CEO ADDRESS

With increased investment over this period there has been development of some new programs supporting children and young people who are victim-survivors of family and domestic violence. Funding from the Paul Ramsay Foundation has been provided to develop an early intervention model for young people with emerging problematic thinking or behaviour. There is an increasing urgency from the community and providers to support families impacted by family and domestic violence. SFV has continued its mission to ensure when we do any work around family and domestic violence it is as safe as possible.

There was continued growth this financial year with a wide range of organisations contacting SFV for training and workforce development engaging us for our evidence-based practice, extensive knowledge and depth of expertise across a wide range of areas. Our team has been working alongside a range of organisations building capacity for safer, evidence-based interventions and services. This work has been further strengthened by funding from Oak Foundation to look at what can be done to support access to critical FDV Informed information and skills through an interactive website which will be launched next financial year.

SFV continue to work in close partnership with our key stakeholders as this helps to connect responses in front line responses to family and domestic violence. A big part of the solution for better practice is making sure perpetrators cannot remain invisible. We recognise that without the investment of many of these stakeholders in SFV we wouldn't be able to have the impact we have had this past year.

I would like to finish by sincerely thanking all of our team for their dedication and commitment to the work and for their passion and drive to start and create sustained change in perpetrator responses in Western Australia. This past year has been hard for many in the sector, but I am always grateful to work alongside so many friends and colleagues who remain unwaveringly committed to creating a better future for the many families experiencing FDV across WA.

# ACTIVITY REPORT

## STOPPING FAMILY VIOLENCE 2023/2024 GRANTS

### **Working with Aboriginal Community Controlled Organisations to respond to men using Family, Domestic and Sexual Violence (DOCG202331633) funded by The Children and Community services Ministerial body Through The Department Of Communities**

Commencing on the 1st November 2023, Stopping Family Violence has been working alongside two ACCOs (Aboriginal Community Controlled Organisations) – 1 metro and 1 regional/remote, with a focus on workforce development across the perpetrator intervention space to increase the safety and wellbeing of women and children. The workforce development will support the ACCOs to work with men who use family, domestic, and sexual violence. A set of guidelines will be developed for the considerations needed in workforce development for ACCOs to safely work with men who are using family, domestic, and sexual violence.

## ***STOPPING FAMILY VIOLENCE 2023/2024 GRANTS***

### **Early Intervention with Adolescents Program.**

#### **Funded by Paul Ramsay Foundation**

This project builds on early intervention pilot programs delivered by SFV at two schools in 2020 and 2022 and with a youth organisation in 2023. Funding over two years was granted via the Paul Ramsay Foundation's 2023 Specialist DFV Programs: National Open Grant Round. Learnings from the previous work pointed to the need for early intervention with adolescent users of FDV to include a systemic approach that supports consistent and evidence-informed multi-agency responses. Therefore, this program included an additional component of sector development, where intersecting systems and services received FDV-informed training to enable them to have the skills and knowledge to identify, respond and refer young people who may be perpetrating or are at risk of perpetrating FDV. Beginning in July 2023, the project has focussed on developing program materials and building partnerships with schools and youth organisations to co-deliver the program. Three sector development training sessions have also been provided. Program delivery to adolescents across multiple sites is scheduled to commence in the latter half of 2024 as well as up to seven more sector development training sessions.



## **STOPPING FAMILY VIOLENCE 2022/2023 GRANTS**

### **Wraparound stakeholder engagement and terms of reference consultancy.**

#### **Funded by ACT Government**

SFV were engaged as consultants to develop revised Terms of Reference for the Wraparound service model, in collaboration with participating agencies and in keeping with recommendations of the Listen. Take Action to Prevent. Believe and Heal report. The Wraparound model was initially established as a best practice coordinated systems response to support victim survivors of sexual offences. However, over time Wraparound had ceased to operate in its original form and instead operated as a referral pathway between agencies. SFV facilitated consultations with key stakeholders and agencies to inform a draft revision of the Terms of Reference for the ACT Domestic, Family and Sexual Violence Office.



## **STOPPING FAMILY VIOLENCE 2022/2023 GRANTS**

### **St John**

“The Department of Communities has provided St John WA with grant funding to deliver a Family and Domestic Violence (FDV)-informed education program to 3,000 emergency response team members including, State Control Centre (SCC), Paramedics and Clinical Volunteers state-wide. SFV was selected as the lead agency to assist with co-designing and co-facilitating the education. The training has been delivered in both metropolitan and regional areas in WA.

The education package has been developed to build the capacity of emergency response team members to recognise and respond to the needs of patients who may be experiencing FDV. It includes two distinct units – "FDV Education Program Unit 1" and "FDV Education Program Unit 2". This first online unit is foundational and is delivered online. The second unit expands on the first and is tailored to the specific requirements of each cohort.

The delivery of the project commenced in October 2023 and it is anticipated to take approximately 12-18 months to roll out.

A separate independent subject matter expert, the Centre for Social Impact at the University of Western Australia has been engaged to complete an evaluation of the effectiveness of the education program, prior to the closure of the grant in June 2026.



## **STOPPING FAMILY VIOLENCE 2023/2024 GRANTS**

### **Strengthening responses to family, domestic and sexualised violence: Building courage, capability and safety together. Funded by Oak Foundation**

This project follows on from earlier work by SFV CEO Damian Green and consultant Rodney Vlasis (with the RIMT University Centre for Innovative Justice) to map the journeys of perpetrators of family violence and the roles and responsibilities of services and agencies. From this work, it became apparent that there is now a need and an opportunity for a more nuanced way of thinking about responsibilities, and also of extending this beyond the service sectors to community responses. Following an extensive consultation period with the Oak Foundation, funding was approved in March 2024 for three years to develop a substantial, high-quality website that will be an accessible, easily navigable portal for a vast range of responders to FDSV perpetrators – those who are part of service systems, and those operating outside these formal/professional spaces – to access resources. This project will support and inspire sharing of knowledge and skills that builds the capacity of diverse workforces and communities to respond to the person causing FDSV harm, within parameters appropriate to their role, degree of risk and the situation.



## **TRAINING AND SUPERVISION**

### **Stopping Family Violence Training Events**

#### **Stopping Family Violence Applying a FDSV Lens 1-Day Training**

In the last financial year, Stopping Family Violence delivered eight one-day training events. This training was designed to support a range of roles and workplaces in recognising and safely responding to FDSV. The training is designed to assist participants in understanding the support and impact they can provide to victim-survivors through their role, with the aim of reducing and responding to the high rates of FDSV.

#### **Stopping Family Violence Best Practice in the Front Line and Intersecting Roles 1-Day Training**

SFV delivered one training event in the metropolitan area to five organisations across the sector and intersecting services. This was in response to the demand for continuous training from those who attended the Applying a FDSV Lens training day. This training focuses on practical, skills-based support with this next step of embedding the knowledge gained from training into their practice.



## TRAINING AND SUPERVISION

### **Supervision: Stopping Family Violence Family and Domestic Violence Informed Supervision Services**

Stopping Family Violence continued to offer supervision services throughout the 2023/24 financial year for those working in the family and domestic violence sector. Throughout the financial year, Stopping Family Violence delivered 22 hours of supervision to 4 different agencies. Supporting employees who have challenging roles in the family and domestic violence sector with best practices and evidence-based advice. Supervision and training are just part of the journey to embedding better practices and responses to FDSV.

### **Training: Safe and Together Provider**

#### **Safe and Together training delivered in 2023/2024 FY**

The Safe & Together Institute is a systems change and training organisation that helps diverse sectors transform their approach to domestic violence and children. Using a behavioural whole-of-family approach, the Institute's Perpetrator Pattern-based Framework encourages interventions with perpetrators as parents and partners of adult survivors.

Stopping Family Violence continued to deliver the Safe & Together Model throughout this financial year. The model is designed to create systems and practice change that is child-centered, to keep children safe and together with the protective parent.



By focusing on four key skills: assessment, interviewing, documentation, and case planning, our experiential training provides the foundation for domestic violence informed practice.

## TRAINING AND SUPERVISION

### Training: Safe and Together Provider cont..

#### Safe and Together Overview Training

Stopping family violence has been running the overview training for frontline workers and delivered 8 trainings this year.

This one-day training provides participants with an introduction to and overview of the Safe & Together Model. The training provides participants with information about creating a domestic violence-informed child welfare system, the principles and components of the Safe & Together Model and information on the framework behind competency-building in child welfare around domestic violence.



#### Safe and Together CORE

Twentyone Safe and Together 4 Day CORE training events were delivered in the 2023/2024 financial year. Stopping Family Violence trained a total of 624 staff across 30 organisations that work in the family and domestic violence sector and intersecting roles.



## TRAINING AND SUPERVISION

### Training: Caring Dads Training Provider

Stopping Family Violence has been in partnership with Caring Dads since 2017. Caring Dads is a group intervention program for men who have abused, neglected, or exposed their children to domestic violence. Stopping Family Violence runs facilitator training events to train facilitators in the Caring Dads model.

The Caring Dads model is focused on the safety and well-being of some of our communities most vulnerable children, through working with fathers who have been abusive, neglectful or violent in their families. The Caring Dads model is focused on the safety and well-being of some of our communities most vulnerable children, through working with fathers who have been abusive, neglectful or violent in their families. Caring Dads is a 17-week program developed around best practice on group intervention for men, that uses outreach and coordinated case management. This training allows participants to become Caring Dads accredited facilitators.

The Caring Dads training is devoted to ensuring the safety and well-being of victim-survivors. Stopping Family Violence educates facilitators who will work with fathers who have been abusive, neglectful, or violent. SFV continued to work closely with Caring Dads and delivered the facilitator training as well as hosting Caring Dads when they visited Perth. We have also visited Brisbane to support them.



## TRAINING AND SUPERVISION

### **Early Intervention with Adolescents Program – Sector Development Training.**

#### **Funded by Paul Ramsay Foundation**

Supporting intersecting systems and services to receive FDV-informed training to enable them to have the skills and knowledge to identify, respond and refer young people who may be perpetrating or are at risk of perpetrating FDV. Training examined the key components of FDV-informed practice, coercive control, contributing factors to FDV, gender roles and stereotyped constructions of masculinity and femininity, myths around FDV, and how services can collaborate to bring perpetrators into view and increase the safety of victim-survivors. In partnership with Ebenezer Aboriginal Corporation who kindly provided the venue, SFV trained 27 practitioners from ten different agencies and organisations located in the North Eastern corridor of Perth, with more training sessions to be delivered in 2024/2025.



## **PARTNERSHIPS AND NETWORKS**

### **Member of the Commissioning Working Group**

**Partnership:** Stopping Family Violence committee member led by the Department of Communities.

**Committee Details:** The Commissioning Working Group was formed under the Community Partnerships Roundtable that was established in October 2020. The Roundtable and its working groups bring together a broad and diverse range of experience and expertise to jointly address matters of strategic importance relevant to the delivery of human services.

**Impact:** As a member of the Commissioning Working Group, input provided by Stopping Family Violence will contribute significantly to stronger governance for the Department of Communities.

### **Men's Behaviour Change Network WA member**

**Partnership:** Men's Behaviour Change Network WA led by Stopping Family Violence commenced in 2017.

**Details:** Since its inception in early 2017, the Men's Behaviour Change Program (MBCP) Network has been working to develop a collective, powerful voice for perpetrator programs in WA and support the ongoing evolution toward a standard of excellence across the sector. The Network has become an important forum for collaborative practice and discussion, and establishing cohesive research and development agendas across the perpetrator response sphere.

**Impact:** The Men's Behaviour Change Network WA is a collaborative group established to strengthen the working relationships across the perpetrator intervention system in Western Australia. The Network provides a forum to support current practice whilst striving to further develop the sector through improved collaboration and evidence-based innovation. The purpose of the Men's Behaviour Change Network WA is to bring the sector together to provide advocacy and support as we work to reduce family and domestic violence in Australia.

## **PARTNERSHIPS AND NETWORKS**

### **Co-Peaks The Centre for Women's Safety and Wellbeing**

**Partnership:** Stopping Family Violence and The Centre for Women's Safety and Wellbeing.

**Details:** This partnership commenced in 2017. The Centre for Women's Safety and Wellbeing is an independent, representative peak body for women's specialist family and domestic violence services and community-based women's health and sexual assault services in Western Australia. It is underpinned by our recognition of the importance of gender equality to reduce violence against women and children and promote health and well-being.

**Impact:** The Centre for Women's Safety and Wellbeing is the co-peak with Stopping Family Violence in the family and domestic violence sector in Western Australia. Partnering with the women's sector gives a cohesive approach to family and domestic violence for women and children and those perpetrating family and domestic violence.

### **Partnership with Preventing Violence Together**

**Partnership:** Stopping Family Violence and Preventing Violence Together (PVT).

**Details:** Stopping Family Violence helped establish PVT in 2020. Preventing Violence Together works to build the capacity of local communities, state agencies and organisations, government, and the private sector to develop, implement, and evaluate effective primary prevention activities. Primary prevention focuses on shifting the culture that permits violence to occur in the first place by identifying and challenging the social norms, practices, and structures that drive violence against women.

**Impact:** Stopping Family Violence works with PVT to foster the primary prevention sector developing in our State by supporting shared approaches, consistent practice, and confident professionals undertaking primary prevention of violence against women throughout WA.

### Respectful Relationships Program

**Partnership:** Stopping Family Violence in partnership with Starick Services and the Department of Education.

**Details:** The Respectful Relationships Program is a pilot project delivered in primary and secondary public schools across WA. The program supports school staff to implement a whole-of-school approach to violence prevention, with a focus on the impacts of gender inequality and preventing family and domestic violence. SFV has partnered with Starick Services and the Department of Education in the delivery of the program. The Respectful Relationships Teaching Support Program has been developed by Starick in partnership with the Department of Communities and the Department of Education to support teachers and school staff in developing knowledge, skills, confidence, and community partnerships.

**Impact:** As part of the program, participants complete foundation family and domestic violence eLearning modules and attend two workshops to explore best practice principles and tools, develop a plan for a whole-of-community approach, and explore future directions and support. SFV brings a key focus on the impacts of gender inequality and family and domestic violence expertise to the partnership and last year we supported two rounds of the program with over 16 schools attending. We have continued to attend schools this financial year



### **Practitioner's Forum with Jackson Katz**

*Stopping Family Violence and the peaks supported a well-attended Practitioners Forum in May 2024 with Dr. Jackson Katz Ph.D. hosted by Communicare and Curtin University. Dr Katz shared his insights about the role of men in preventing FDV and discussed the bystander approach to gender violence and bullying prevention.*

## PARTNERSHIPS AND NETWORKS

### Men's Behaviour Change Program Network (MBCPN)

**Partnership:** Stopping Family Violence is the founding organisation of WA's MBCPN

**Details:** The Men's Behaviour Change Network WA is a collaborative group established to strengthen the working relationships across the perpetrator intervention system in Western Australia. The Network provides a forum to support current practice whilst striving to further develop the sector through improved collaboration and evidence based innovation. The purpose of the Men's Behaviour Change Network is to bring the sector together to provide advocacy and support as we work to reduce family and domestic violence in Australia.

**Impact:** The MBCPN presented a workshop at the Journey to Ending Family, Domestic & Sexual Violence Conference titled "He is an abusive partner, but he is a Good Dad". Development of the MBCPN website continued with a view to launching in the next financial year. Planning for the launch of the Perpetrator Intervention Practitioner Community of Practice was finalised, with 24 registrations accepted for the first session in July 2024.

## **PARTNERSHIPS AND NETWORKS**

### **Healthy Relationships Strategy Group South East Metropolitan**

**Partnership:** Stopping Family Violence is a member of the Healthy Relationships Strategy Group

**Details:** Stopping Family Violence attends monthly meetings as part of the Healthy Relationships Strategy Group for the South East Metropolitan corridor. With the Town of Victoria Park as the backbone organisation, these meetings bring together delegates from WAPOL, women's services, perpetrator response, the City of Belmont, the City of Canning, financial services, housing, and alcohol and other drugs to identify early intervention strategies for domestic violence in the local community.

**Impact:** As the committee's only representative for perpetrator response, SFV offers an important voice to this cross-sector collaborative discussion and implementation. SFV aims to ensure that perpetrator accountability and empowering survivors of family and domestic violence remain top priorities in the committee's discussions.

### **Network Member Humanitarian Entrants Interagency Network (HEIN)**

**Partnership:** Stopping Family Violence is a member of the HEIN Network led by ASeTTS.

**Details:** Stopping Family Violence commenced with the network in 2017. Metropolitan multicultural networks are gatherings of government, non-government agencies, and community groups to share information, knowledge, and resources to better support culturally and linguistically diverse (CaLD) communities.

**Impact:** The Humanitarian Entrants Interagency Network facilitates relationships, collaboration, support, and the sharing of information, practice, and ideas among agencies that provide services to people from refugee backgrounds.



## **PARTNERSHIPS AND NETWORKS**

### **WA Family Law Pathways Network**

**Partnership:** Stopping Family Violence is a member of the Western Australia Family Law Pathways Network Steering Committee.

**Details:** The objective of the Western Australia Family Law Pathways Network is to foster strong links with locally based providers who operate as part of, or alongside, the family law system, to enhance collaboration and improve overall assistance to separated and separating families.

**Impact:** The WA Family Law Pathways Network hosts an annual two-day conference for those working in the family law system to help improve their practice so they can assist with families who have separated or are separating. As well as being involved in the conference planning, two members of the SFV team attended the conference.

## EVENTS

### Stopping Family Violence Conference 2023

**Partnership:** Stopping Family Violence (SFV) co- hosted with the Centre for Women’s Safety and Wellbeing (CWSW) the biennial conference

**Details:** Titled “The Journey to Ending Family Domestic and Sexual Violence. This was a 3 day event held in September, there were 117 organisations and 367 attendees. With a wide range of people this year, coming from regional WA and many flying in from Eastern States. This conference addressed the importance of having children and young peoples needs and voices as a priority, the importance of recognising and responding to perpetrators as the cause of harm, the importance of adult and child victim survivor lead practices that are FDV informed, traumainformed and strengths based.

**Impact:** This 3 day event, hosted many attendees from across the sector, including Police, policy workers, FDV workers and insercting roles. It brought together both Government and non-government organisations to explore the relationships between primary prevention early intervention, response and recovery and healing, and how each plays a vital role in ending family, domestic and sexual violence. Over the three days this conference explored key research and policy work with speakers from across the country joining us to share their expertise and knowledge.



## EVENTS

### 16 Days of Activism 2023

**Partnership:** Stopping Family Violence funded by the Department of Communities supports the family, domestic and sexual violence sector.

**Details:** Stopping Family Violence had an active role in 16 Days of Activism by supporting the sector and raising awareness, motivating positive actions and advocacy. Stopping Family Violence attended the annual Silent March, Midland March, and the 16 Days Morning Tea

CEO Damian Green spoke at the CWSW March calling on men within the sector to join him on the stage. Damian Green also attended the Rockingham Kwinana Safe Family Alliance March, with Mark O'Hare speaking at webinars for the Department of Justice.

**Impact:** The campaign starts on November 25 November, which is the International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women. The campaign runs until December 10, Human Rights Day. The campaign was started by activists at the inaugural Women's Global Leadership Institute in 1991 and is coordinated each year by the Center for Women's Global Leadership. The campaign is used as an organising strategy by individuals and organisations around the world to raise awareness and call for the prevention and elimination of violence against women and children.

## **EVENTS**

### **Family Safety Summit**

Project Manager, Kyalie Moore, ran a 3 hour workshop, with Men's Behaviour Change Coordinator David Batty. This was at the Geraldton Regional Aboriginal Medical Service, 'How to collaborate to deliver a program for First Nations men seeking a stronger and healthier relationship with their partners, family and community'. This initiative aims to address family and domestic violence and create a pathway to positive change. The brief intervention program includes a comprehensive 10 session topics, individual support and community activities to include a 'On country cultural camp with the men and their sons'. The focus throughout will be on empowering men to challenge and transform their behaviour. there were 117 organisations involved and an estimated 350 attendees.

### **Safe and Together Conference**

Stopping Family Violence's Damian Green, Mark O'Hare and Colleen West attended the Safe and Together conference, held in Melbourne, They delivered a workshop "he is an abusive partner but he is a good dad' to 50 participants from a range of workforces across Australia.

### **Coercive Control**

Stopping Family Violence filmed a lecture as a guest speaker on coercive control for UWA, for 32 attendees.

### **Our Watch**

Stopping Family Violence attended the OurWatch consultation on working with men and boys, this included 10 organisations.
